

Key Data from June 2025 Household Affordability Index

Economic justice through the lens of human dignity

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The June 2025 Household Affordability Index, which tracks the prices of 44 basic foods from 47 supermarkets and 32 butcheries, in Johannesburg (Soweto, Alexandra, Tembisa and Hillbrow), Durban (KwaMashu, Umlazi, Isipingo, Durban CBD, Hammarsdale and Pinetown), Cape Town (Khayelitsha, Gugulethu, Philippi, Langa, Delft and Dunoon), Pietermaritzburg, Mtubatuba (in Northern KwaZulu-Natal), and Springbok (in the Northern Cape), shows that:

- In June 2025: The average cost of the Household Food Basket is **R5 443,12**.
- Month-on-month: The average cost of the Household Food Basket *decreased* by R23,46 (-0,4%), from R5 466,59 in May 2025 to R5 443,12 in June 2025.
- **Year-on-year**: The average cost of the Household Food Basket *increased* by **R190,36 (3,6%)**, from R5 252,77 in June 2024 to R5 443,12 in June 2025.

Food pricing trends in June 2025.

In June, of the 44 foods tracked in the basket: 19 foods increased in price, and 25 foods decreased in price. See page 2 of June 2025, Household Affordability Index.

Below are the month-on-month price movements of individual foods in the average household food basket: Foods in the basket which <u>increased</u> in price in June 2025 by 5% or more, include: onions (9%), and beef (5%).

Foods in the basket which <u>increased</u> in price in June 2025 by 2% or more, include: white sugar (2%), stock cubes (2%), chicken gizzards (4%), chicken livers (2%), beef liver (3%), wors (4%), carrots (2%), and tinned pilchards (2%).

Foods in the basket which <u>decreased</u> in price in June 2025, by 5% or more, include: potatoes (-11%), butternut (-5%), green pepper (-7%), and bananas (-8%).

Foods in the basket which <u>decreased</u> in price in June 2025, by 2% or more, include: rice (-3%), sugar beans (-2%), curry powder (-3%), full cream milk (-2%), fish (-2%), cremora (-2%), polony (-4%), and brown bread (-3%).

Inflation on the food baskets per area tracked.

In June 2025, food baskets in Joburg, Pietermaritzburg, and Mtubatuba increased in price. Food baskets in Durban, Cape Town and Springbok decreased in price.

The Joburg basket *increased* by R38,38 (0,7%) month-on-month, and *increased* by R108,97 (2,0%) year-on-year, to **R5 648,85** in June 2025.

The Durban basket *decreased* by R115,65 (-2,1%) month-on-month, and *increased* by R184,39 (3,6%) year-on-year, to **R5 312,22** in June 2025.

The Cape Town basket *decreased* by R31,95 (-0,6%) month-on-month, and *increased* by R296,48 (5,8%) year-on-year, to **R5 397,23** in June 2025.

The Springbok basket *decreased* by R107,51 (-1,8%) month-on-month, and *increased* by R300,47 (5,5%) year-on-year, to **R5 772,43** in June 2025.

The Pietermaritzburg basket *increased* by R96,45 (1,9%) month-on-month, and *increased* by R59,35 (1,2%) year-on-year, to **R5 147,25** in June 2025.

The Mtubatuba basket *increased* by R27,59 (0,5%) month-on-month, and *increased* by R194,23 (3,7%) year-on-year, to **R5 427,65** in June 2025.

Statistics South Africa's latest Consumer Price Index.

Statistics South Africa's latest *Consumer Price Index* for May 2025¹ shows that **Headline inflation was 2,8%**, and for the **lowest expenditure quintiles 1-3 it is 4,6%**, **4,1%**, and **3,7%** respectively. **CPI Food inflation was 4,4%** (for CPI Food & NAB it was 4,8%, we use the figure excluding non-alcoholic beverages). STATS SA's *Producer Price Index* for April 2025² shows *Agriculture was 4,7%*, of which, *Products of crops and horticulture* was **7,0%**, and *Live animals and animal products* was **1,2%**.

Workers

The National Minimum Wage is R28,79 per hour, R230,32 for an 8-hour day, and R4 836,72 for an average 21-day working month.

In June 2025, with **20 working-days**, the maximum National Minimum Wage for a General Worker is **R4 606,40**. Workers work to support their families. The wage workers earn is not just to sustain themselves alone, it is used to support the entire family. For Black South African workers, **one wage typically must support 4 people**. **Dispersed in a worker's family of 4 persons, the NMW, is R1 151,60 per person – this is below the upper-bound poverty line of R1 634 per person per month.**

The June 2025 average cost of a basic nutritional food basket for a family of four persons is **R3 809,26** (See page 6 of June 2025, Household Affordability Index).

On our calculations, using Pietermaritzburg-based figures for electricity and transport, and the average figure for a minimum nutritional basket of food for a family of four, puts electricity, and transport, taking up **57,4%** of a worker's wage (R2 642,97/R4 606,40). Food is bought after monies for transport and electricity have been paid for or set aside (leaving **R1 963,43** – for food and everything else), and so in June 2025, PMBEJD calculates that workers' families will **underspend on food by a minimum of 48,5%** (having R1 963,43 left over after transport and electricity have been paid, and with food for the month costing R3 809,26). **In this scenario there is no possibility of a worker being able to afford enough nutritious food for her family.** If the entire R1 963,43 all went to buy food, then for a family of 4 persons, **it would provide R490,85 per person per month. This is below the food poverty line of R796** (See page 8 of June 2025, Household Affordability Index).

Women and children

In June 2025, the average monthly cost to feed a child a basic nutritious diet was **R970,89**. Over the past month, the average cost to feed a child a basic nutritious diet *decreased* by **R8,77** (-0,9%). Year-on-year, the average cost to feed a child a basic nutritious diet *increased* by **R35,80** (3,8%). See page 6 of June 2025, Household Affordability Index.

In June 2025, the **Child Support Grant** of **R560** is **30%** below the **Food Poverty Line** of **R796**, and **42%** below the average monthly **cost to feed a child a basic nutritious diet (R970,89).**

Household domestic and personal hygiene products

The June 2025 Household Domestic & Personal Hygiene Index **increased** by **R11,96** (1,2%) month-on-month. Year-on-year the household domestic and personal hygiene products index **increased** by **R11,81** (1,1%) bringing the total average cost of basic household domestic and personal hygiene products to **R1 041,47** in June 2025 (See page 5 of June 2025, Household Affordability Index).

The cost of basic hygiene products is high. These products are part of the monthly groceries, and compete in the household purse with food. These products are essential for good health and hygiene; and dignity.
